

Abbreviations (in American crochet terms):

sc - single crochet, hdc - half double crochet, dc - double crochet, t - treble, sts - stitch (es), motif - repeated sts of the pattern, * - repeat from * till *, ch - chain (s).

Exact gauge is not critical for this project - see that you love the result with chosen yarn and hook. With smaller hooks you can make the stitches denser and vice versa. If you wish to repeat the original tension make sure the width of the piece is 23 cm (9").

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Crochet wrap/scarf Diagonal Seashells

Original size: 23 cm (9") width; 107 cm (42") length.

Yarn: take 105 gr of 100 % wool yarn approx. 550 m in 100 gr / 600 yards in 3.5 oz; it equals to 3 ply (UK), Light Fingering (USA) or Lace. Total yardage: 630 yards.

Hook: 3 mm.

Photo on the left shows *stretched out stitches*; in the reality the stitches look more dense.

The project is perfect for de-stashing one 100-gr-skein - work till it ends. You can join last row with the first one into a loop to make a wrap as in the photo below or continue crocheting longer scarf (in this case yarn usage will increase).



With a bigger hook chain **79**. Add more chains if you want to make this wrap/scarf wider; see that the amount of chains in the foundation row is a multiple of 12 (for one motif) + 7 for the edges. For six motifs (as in the original wrap) chain $6 \times 12 + 7 = 79$.

1st row: chain 3 (count as 1st dc), 2 dc in 4th ch from hook, *skip 2 ch, work 1 dc into next ch, skip 2 ch, work 5 dc into next ch, skip 2 ch, work 1 dc into next ch, skip 2 ch, work 1 t into next ch, ch 2, 1 t into the same ch with the previously completed one t, ch 2, 1 t into the same ch with the previously completed two t*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing 1 dc in 4th ch counting from the end work 3 dc into final ch.

stitches (1 t, 2 ch, 1 t, 2 ch, 1 t) will be called 3-t shell,

stitches (5 dc in 1 sts) will be called 5-dc shell.

2nd row: chain 1, 1 sc in 1st dc, *skip 2 dc, work *3-t shell* into alone standing dc of the previous row, 1 sc into central t of 3-t shell, *5-dc shell* into alone standing dc, skip 2 dc, work 1 sc into central dc of 5-dc shell*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing last *3-t shell* finish with 1 sc in 3rd ch in the beginning of the previous row.

 3^{rd} row: chain 6 (count as 1 t + 2 ch), 1 t in 1^{st} sc, *1 sc into central t of 3-t shell of the previous row, 3-t shell in 1 sc, skip 2 dc, work 1 sc into central dc of 5-dc shell, skip 2 dc, work 5-dc shell in 1 sc*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing 1 sc into central t of last 3-t shell finish with (1 t, 2 ch, 1 t) in last sc.

4th row: chain 1, 1 sc in 1st t, *5-dc shell in 1 sc of the previous row, skip 2 dc, work 1 sc into central dc of 5-dc shell, skip 2 dc, work 3-t shell in 1 sc, 1 sc into central t of 3-t shell*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing last 5-dc shell finish with 1 sc in 4th ch in the beginning of the previous row.

5th row: chain 3 (count as 1st dc), 2 dc in 1st sc, *skip 2 dc of the previous row, work 1 sc into central dc of 5-dc shell, skip 2 dc, work 5-dc shell in 1 sc, 1 sc into central t of 3-t shell, 3-t shell in 1 sc*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing 1 sc into central dc of last 5-dc shell finish with 3 dc in last sc.

Repeat rows 2-5 constantly.

Last row work as follows (replace sc-sts in 5th row with hdc-sts): chain 3 (count as 1st dc), 2 dc in 1st sc, *skip 2 dc of the previous row, work 1 hdc into central dc of 5-dc shell, skip 2 dc, work 5-dc shell in 1 sc, 1 hdc into central t of 3-t shell, 3-t shell in 1 sc*, repeat from * till * across the row, after completing 1 hdc into central dc of last 5-dc shell finish with 3 dc in last sc.

For wrap: sew first and last rows - work row of sc-sts joining both short edges or just sew with sewing needle and main yarn.

For **scarf** - decorate the edges with fringe or tassels or leave as it is.

WASH INSTRUCTIONS:

To keep your wool wrap looking its best, hand wash in cold or luke warm water with mild soap, roll in a towel to remove excess water and lay flat to dry. Never machine wash or dry!
